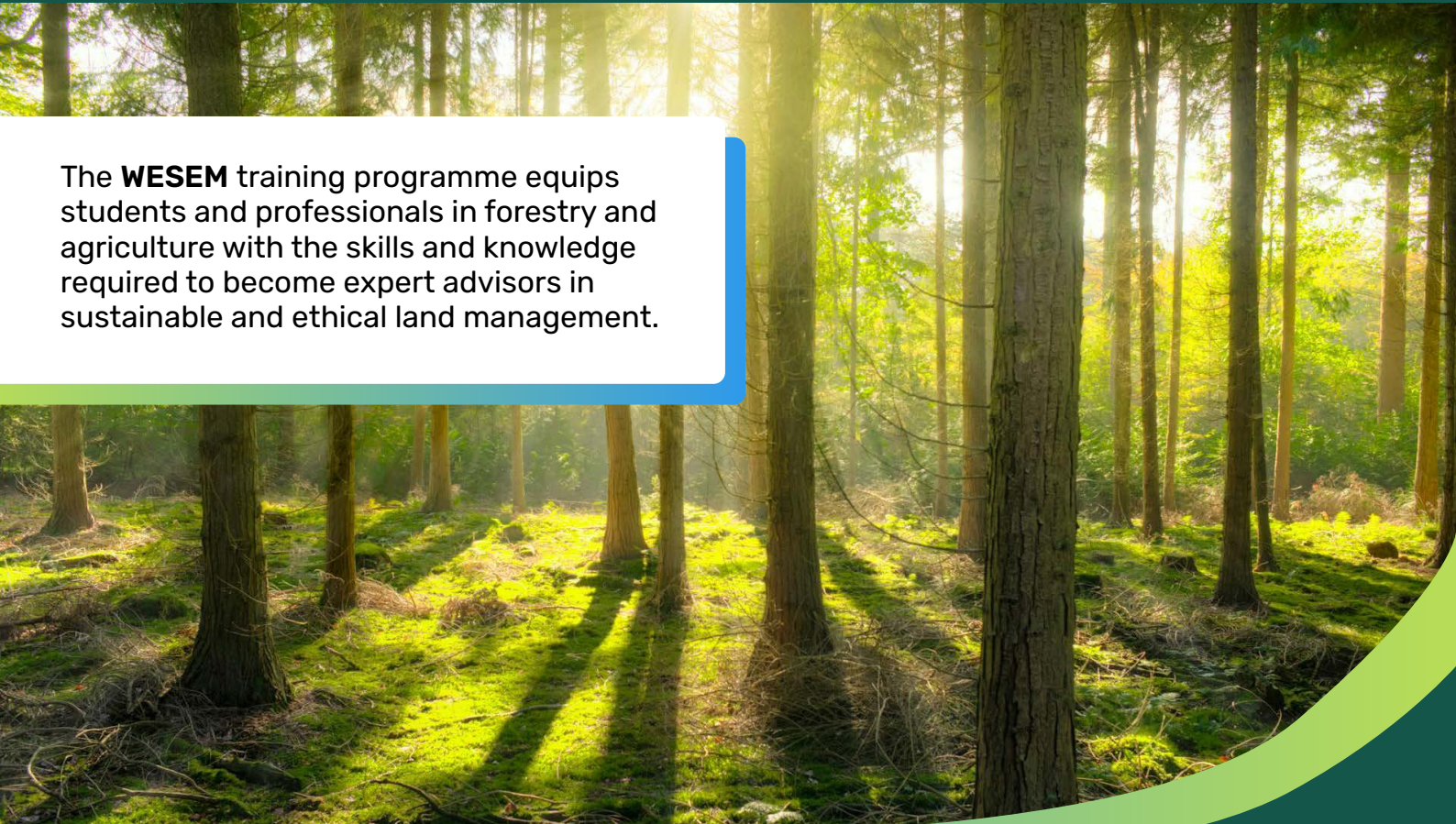




The **WESEM** training programme equips students and professionals in forestry and agriculture with the skills and knowledge required to become expert advisors in sustainable and ethical land management.
